It's Time to Hang Up My Dance Shoes!



Dance shoes? No, I don't dance. Many organists play in their socks. Many organists play in special shoes made for organists. I wear ballet instructor shoes. They need to stay on your feet, be smooth on the bottom so they slide easily from pedal to pedal, have round to square toes, and be very flexible. A tiny heel helps to rest your feet on the bar under the organ bench, so you don't accidentally play the pedals during the sermon. Chancel Choir jokingly asked if they should chip in and buy me some new shoes. Seriously, I have looked and just never found any. I think my shoes were trying to tell me something. My dance shoes are being hung up (or tossed out) on May 30, 2022.

I would like to share a little history and a few memories with all of you.

My family moved to Neenah Thanksgiving weekend in 1978. I told my kids we wouldn't miss a beat. We would do the same things in Neenah that we did in Milwaukee. We looked for a Boy Scout and Girl Scout troop. We went to Our Savior's the Sunday after we moved in and my seven- and eight-year-old children were in the Sunday School Christmas program the same year.

I got a call the very first week at OSLC from Hannah Gregory who surprisingly said she knew my uncle and exactly where my home church was. What a welcome to a new town and new church! Several days later I got a call from Eileen Anderson who asked if I would accompany the "Sunbeams" Choir. Does anyone remember those little kids in the bright yellow choir robes and all those children's musicals? Not long after that I started accompanying the high school choir, RSV (Revised Standard Version) – the big kids in the bright blue robes. Hazel Anderson was the organist and she asked me to play for church the first weekend of October (women's retreat weekend) every year. Those weekends were probably the only weekends she didn't play, until she retired. When OSLC began the Saturday 5:00 PM service, I was asked to play. I have no idea what year that was!

Life went on and we had two babies baptized at OSLC, four children confirmed at OSLC, one daughter married at OSLC, and one granddaughter baptized at OSLC. Two daughters, sons-in-law and grandchildren were Mary, Joseph, and Baby Jesus for Christmas Eve. Those babies are now 12 and 13 years old.

I left OSLC the summer of 1995 for a full-time organist position at St Tim's in Menasha. I was there until October 2000; at which time I was recruited to come back to OSLC as part of a 4-person music team. I was hired to be the organist at the 5 PM and 8 AM services, all weekends except the first weekend of the month, and to be the Chancel Choir accompanist. LuAnn Stensburg was hired for the first weekend of each month. Kim Filippi was hired for the 10:30 service and Joyful Noise (not yet named) and bells. Jim Hart was hired for vocal choirs. Eventually Kim moved to Minnesota and Jim left for theater opportunities in Oshkosh. It was then, I was given the 10:30 service and Joyful Noise.

As part of my music responsibilities, I was a member of the Music and Worship Teams. Eventually they became one team. That brought more musicals, Christmas Stables, Christmas Sunday School programs with goodie bags for 135 kids, special Love services, Mardi Gras services, Pentecost Kite services, Lessons & Carols ser-

vices, Palm Sunday services, Pet Blessing services, Taizé services with miles of red fabric and candles, Glory to God services, Palms to Go and Ashes to Go.

I will never forget the Palm Sunday that the music team organized the Palm Sunday breakfast and did all the services. The music team did the behind the scenes and advance prep. Some dedicated OSLC members ran the show on Sunday. I look back now and wonder, "What were we thinking?"

Rally Weekend services were outdoors. We put plywood panels on the ground for the keyboard and bench so they wouldn't tip over. There were 100' extension cords all over the ground to plug in equipment. Dish soap and soda were used to keep the bees away. Clothes pins kept the music from blowing away. We were rained out one year and moved the outdoor service into the gym with pop-up tents and all! It was still lots of fun, despite the rain.

Christmas and Easter were always a challenge to juggle all the services and still try to have a little time with family, but they were the "fun" services to play because the church was full, and EVERYBODY sang. Weddings and funerals made me nervous because you only get one chance to get it right! If you mess up the music on Saturday or Sunday, you always have the next service to prove you can play it right.

The organ died at the Thanksgiving service in 2000. It started playing by itself (electrical problem, not ghosts). The pedals also stopped working. I played the pedals, and my daughter sat on the floor and pulled them up. That only lasted a service or two and we gave up. A committee was formed to research whether to repair or buy new. A very generous member of OSLC offered to match up to \$20,000 if the congregation could up with the other \$20,000 that we needed to replace the organ. We did it! In November of 2001, the new organ was installed. Please check out the wall hanging just above the organ. Phil Carlson, a long-time member of OSLC, made the wall hanging from the wooden case of the old organ. The cross is made from two of the old organ pipes.

There were many more projects over the years related to music. Purchase of new hymnbooks, clavinova, drums, file cabinets for the music room, move to the new music room, spray painting the old music stands behind the garage, selection of new music stands and lights (generously given in memory of Lee Jannusch), the selection of service hymns, watering pianos, tuning pianos, repairing organ, washing 59 choir robes (2 at a time), sewing the zippers and hooks and eyes back on the robes. We purchased a digital piano so Joyful Noise could visit the homebound and sing. It was also easier to move outside for services. It took four good men to take the clavinova outside, so this was a big improvement.

The purchase of the new hymnbooks was a huge project. They arrived in 2006/2007. Then, came the challenge. How do you adjust to a new hymn book after about 30 years in the old green LBW books? Kim Jannusch, Lori Hein, Ardy Kreuter, and I meet one night a week for two hours. I think it took us about six weeks. They sang, I played. We color coded every hymn in the new cranberry ELW hymn book. They are coded as: those we know, they we kind-of-know, those we like and want to teach, those that are only singable by a choir or soloist. The ones we coded black are the hymns that we labeled as "Why were these ever included in the hymnbook. They are unsingable!" I'm not sure if "unsingable" is a word, but you know what I mean. We also created a list and timetable for teaching new hymns.

The whole worship team met several evenings. We played and sang the 10 new liturgy settings in the ELW hymn book. We selected two setting that we wanted to learn. We are now comfortable singing both setting 6 & 8.

In the early days, with the assistance of Kim Jannusch, we did a full inventory of the choir music, put it in folders, in alphabetical order by title and church season, created a data base of title, composer, church season, vocal arrangement, number of copies and if it had instrumental parts.

For those of you who are new to the congregation, I hope you have enjoyed this bit of OSLC history. For those who are long-time members, I hope this brings back fond memories. I want to thank you for the opportunity to have served as your full-time organist for the past 22 years and part time musician for the past 43 years. To all the musicians that have so faithfully assisted in worship, thank you! Without your dedication, none of this would have been possible.
