

Winter Solstice

The winter solstice, December 21st, marks the beginning of winter in the northern hemisphere. On this day the North Pole reaches its maximum tilt away from the sun, which causes the Sun to travel the shortest path through the sky. For this reason, this day has the least daylight and the longest night.

Importance of creating a time and space of solace

The holiday season offers many opportunities for celebration, generosity, feasting, hope, joy, love and peace. There are songs, parties, traditions, gifts and memories shared that hold space for these wonderful things. While Advent is a season of hope and Christmas is a season of joy, not everyone feels hopeful or like celebrating. Those who have experienced loss—of a job, a home, a relationship, their health—will be adjusting to new realities. Those grieving the death of a loved one (whether their passing happened recently or years ago) will feel the pain of empty seats at holiday parties. Those who are struggling with addiction at parties with fully stocked bars, miss a loved one deployed overseas or those struggling with illness might feel out of place during a time with so much celebration. Even those who are not struggling with losses may feel the stress of preparations and expectations around Christmas time.

C And also with you.


Prayer

Candle Lighting Litany

- L: We light four candles tonight in honor of our loved ones. We light one for our grief, one for our courage, one for our memories, and one for our love.
- P: This candle represents our grief.
 We own the pain of losing loved ones,
 of dreams that go unfulfilled,
 of hopes that evaporate in despair.

Leader lights a candle; brief silence follows.

L: This candle represents our courage.

It symbolizes the courage to confront our sorrow, to comfort each other, to share our feelings honestly and openly with each other, and to dare to hope in the midst of pain.

Pastor lights a candle; a brief silence follows.

P: This candle represents our memories.

For the times we laughed together, cried together, were angry with each other or overjoyed with each other.

We light this candle for the memories of caring and joy we shared together.

Leader lights a candle; a brief silence follows

L: This candle represents our love.

The love we have given, and the love we have received.

The love that has gone unacknowledged and unfelt,
and the love that has been shared in times of joy and sorrow.

Pastor lights a candle; a brief silence follows.

P: You are invited to come forward to light one of the candles to remember a loved one who can't be with you this Christmas. You can also light a candle to express a loss: of a job, a home, a relationship, your health.

When all the people have had the opportunity to light candles the leader continues

L: We light the Christ candle, remembering that Jesus Christ is always in the center of our lives. He hears our cries, he knows our hearts and, in the midst of all our thoughts and emotions, he offers us hope and healing.

Pastor lights the Christ candle.

- P Let us pray.
- C Comforting God, wrap us in your presence in this time of remembrance.
- P With these candles, help us find your light, a light that will guide us day by day, step by step, as we try to live life fully and wholly.
- C We cherish the special ways in which we have been touched by our loved ones. We thank you for the gift their lives have been to us. Now comfort us, encourage us, empower us. Amen.


¹³Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. ¹⁵While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, ¹⁶but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. ¹⁷And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad. ¹⁸Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" ¹⁹He asked them, "What things?" They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, ²⁰and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. ²¹But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place.

²⁸As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. ²⁹But they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." So he went in to stay with them. ³⁰When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. ³¹Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. ³²They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" ³³That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. ³⁴They were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!" ³⁵Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

HEALING

The order for healing is an expression in worship of the church's ministry of healing. Here all who sense the need of God's healing in any aspect of their lives may join in prayer for others and themselves. Here each person may come to receive a word of blessing and prayer. Here each one may also receive a physical gesture of healing: the laying on of hands, which may be accompanied by anointing with oil. These signs, first given in baptism, tell us again that we are sealed by the Holy Spirit



and marked forever with the cross of Christ, who is health and salvation for the world.

Introduction

P In its ministry of healing, the church does not replace the gifts of God that come through the scientific community nor does it promise a cure. Rather, the church offers and celebrates gifts such as these:

God's presence with strength and comfort in time of suffering, God's promise of wholeness and peace, and

God's love embodied in the community of faith.

A Our Lord Jesus healed many as a sign of the reign of God come near and sent the disciples to continue this work of healing—with prayer, the laying on of hands, and anointing. In the name of Christ, the great healer and reconciler of the world, we now entrust to God all who are in need of healing.

C Hear our prayer.

A O God, we bring these intercessions before you, knowing that you will hear us as you have promised, and will answer according to the mercy shown in your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

C Amen.

Those who wish to receive laying on of hands and anointing may come forward down the center aisle to kneel or stand at the rail.

C Amen


The Lord's Prayer
